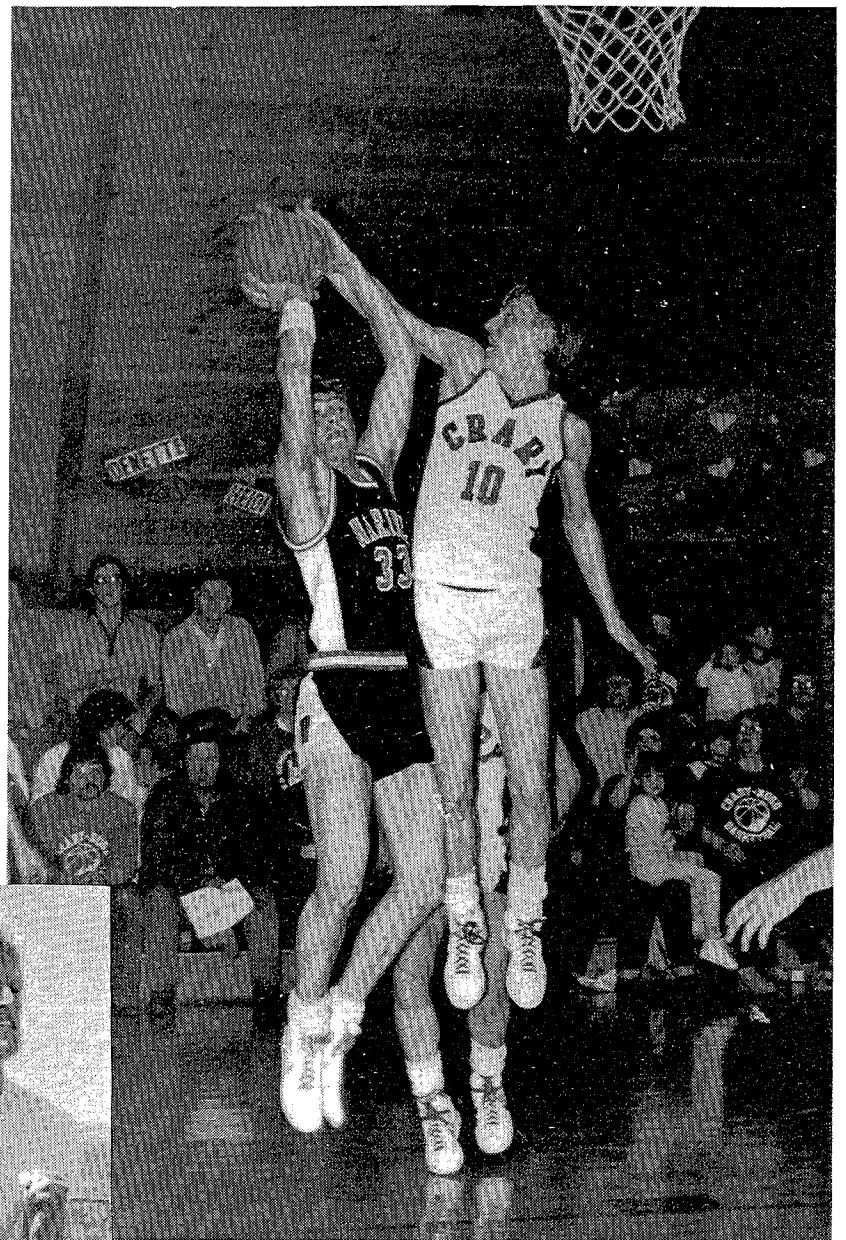
Dr. Gary Holman resigned July 1986 and Alan J. Mealka, Assistant Superintendent at the Indiana School for the Deaf, was named his successor.

Amanda Carbaugh was the first NDS student to advance to the State Science Fair in 1989.

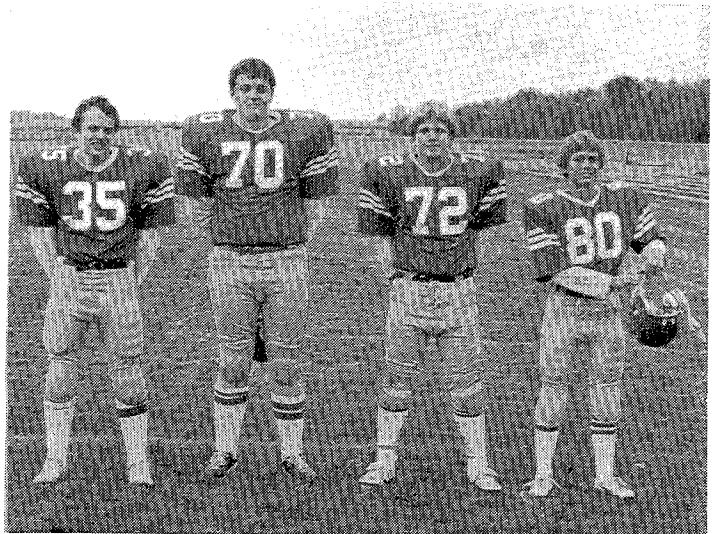

During the 1986-87 school year, the NDSB basketball players and Crary basketball players formed a co-op team and competed as one team. The Crary/NDSB boys's basketball team is nicknamed Cardinals while the NDSB/Crary track team is nicknamed Bulldogs. NDSB is the only school for the deaf in the nation with two athletic team nicknames. Other areas of athletics were co-oped with Devils Lake Public Schools—girls' basketball, wrestling, football and cross country. Grade school students participated in flag football. Fall 1986 saw **THE BANNER** reduced to three issues a year—fall, winter, and spring. The subscription price remained the same. Crary-NDSB took third place in the 1987 Ramsey County Tournament and second place in District 8. Brian Billman made the Ramsey County All-Tournament Team.

The first annual summer camp for deaf/hearing impaired children was held in June 1987. The camp was available to any deaf/hearing impaired child in North Dakota between the ages of 8-12. A Family Learning Vacation was held in July 1987 and focused on communication within the family. Lita Aldrige, Gallaudet University, was the facilitator of the workshop and financial assistance was received from North Dakota Vocational Rehabilitation.

"Workshop on Hearing Impairment" was the first workshop sponsored by the Coalition of Service Providers to the Hearing Impaired and was held in Bismarck in September 1987. The Coalition was started the fall of 1986 with NDSB, Bismarck Special Services, and Souris Valley Special Services as the originators. Later that same year, the Coalition expanded to include Jamestown, Dickinson, and West Fargo.

An Outreach Program was started in January 1988 to promote services for the deaf offered at NDSB. Crary-NDSB was defeated by Lakota for first place honors in the District 8 Tournament in 1988. Brian Billman was named to the All-District 8 Team, Ramsey County All-Tourney Team, and All Lake Region Team. The team took the

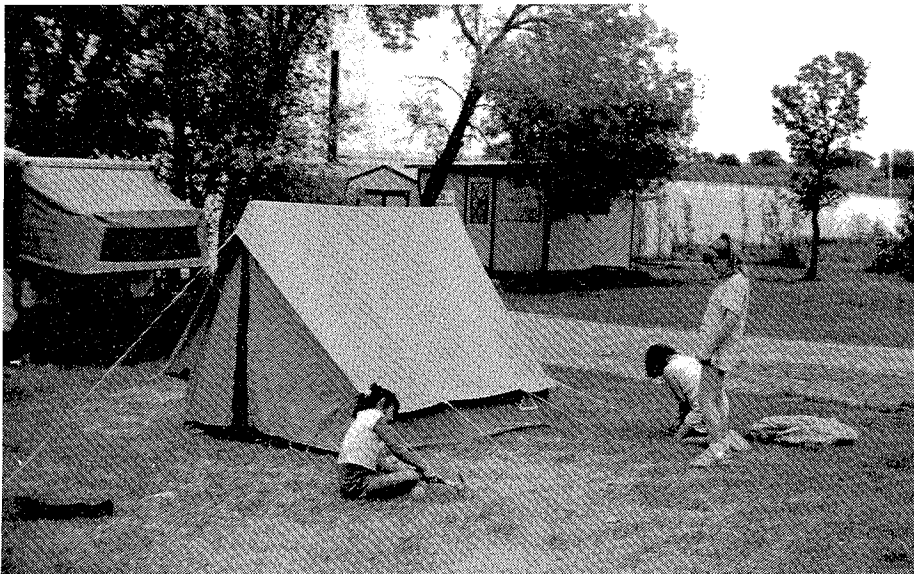
consolation championship in the Ramsey County Tournament.

Nicky Finck, sophomore, set a new record in the javelin of 89'3" at the 1988 Peace Garden Meet.

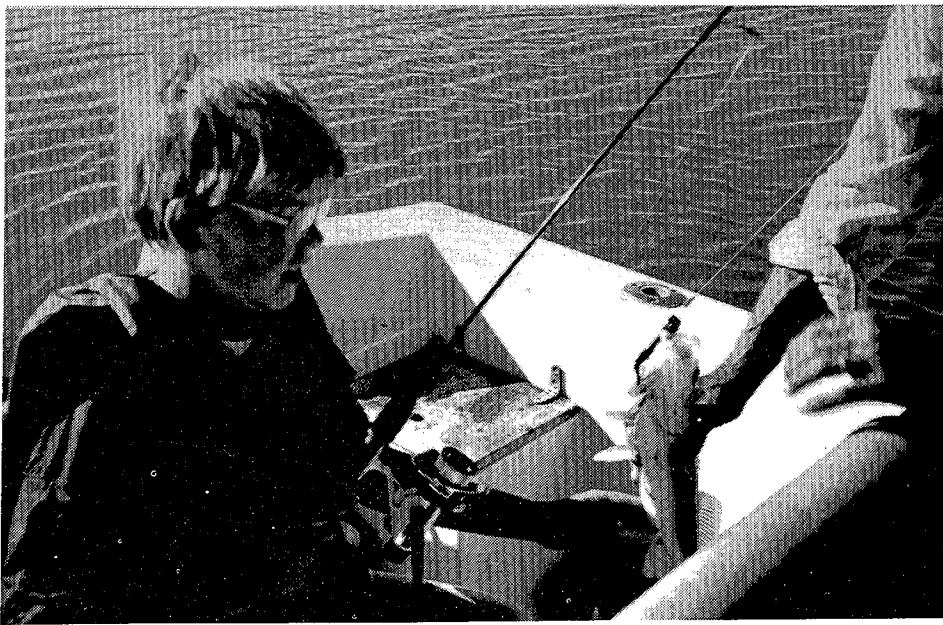
The boys' dormitory, which had graced the campus since 1923, was demolished the summer of 1988. The Army National Guard and the Air National Guard had the honor of tearing it down. By the time school started the end of August, a new growth of grass was well on its way.



Two summer camps were held in 1988. The first one was for children ages 7-11 and the second one for children ages 12-16. 42 deaf and hearing impaired students (21 from programs other than NDS) participated in the camps.

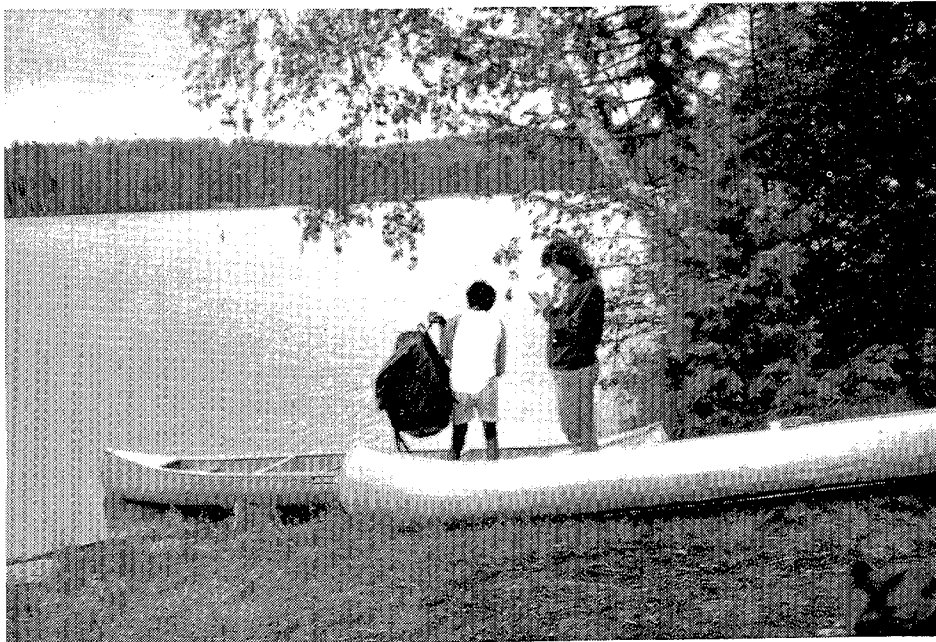


A volunteer program was officially started in the fall of 1988. Cindy and Aaron Lapp, parents of a preschool student, organized a Parent Hot Line to promote communication between parents and to support parents through various phases of raising a deaf or a hearing impaired child.



A Burton W. Driggs Scholarship was created at Gallaudet University by his daughter, Sabey Driggs Pingree. Preference in granting the scholarships will be given to students from North Dakota, Utah, and Idaho.

Three summer camps were held in 1989—one for ages 6-9, one for ages 10-14, and the third for ages 15-19. 51 students participated in the camps. 25 of the participants were from programs other than NDSU.



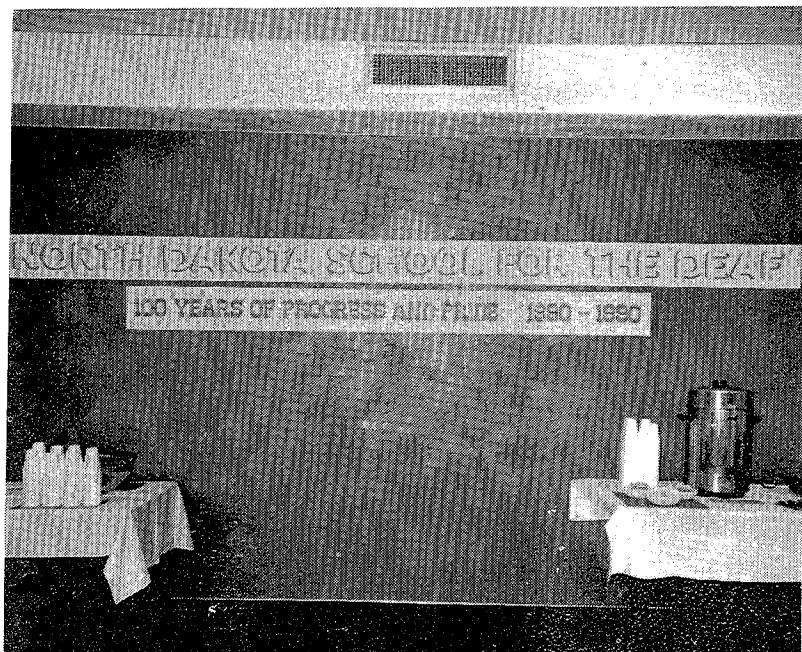
The "NDSO Video" made its debut at the Open House held after the annual Christmas Dinner in December 1988.

Brian Billman, '88, was named Midwest Athlete of the Year by the Midwest Athletic Association of the Deaf. Brian took fourth place in the long jump in the World Games of the Deaf in New Zealand in January 1989. Darrell Coyle, '80, placed 5th in the long jump.

January 1989 saw the return of a NDSO tradition—Homecoming. An activity filled weekend was enjoyed by students, alumni, and friends. Crary-NDSO placed third in both the Ramsey County and District 8 Tournaments. Russell Hoover copped a place on the All-County Team, the All-District 8 Team, and the All Lake Region Team. The Fairmont Theatre of the Deaf performed at NDSO in April 1989 for the formal kickoff for the NDSO Centennial.

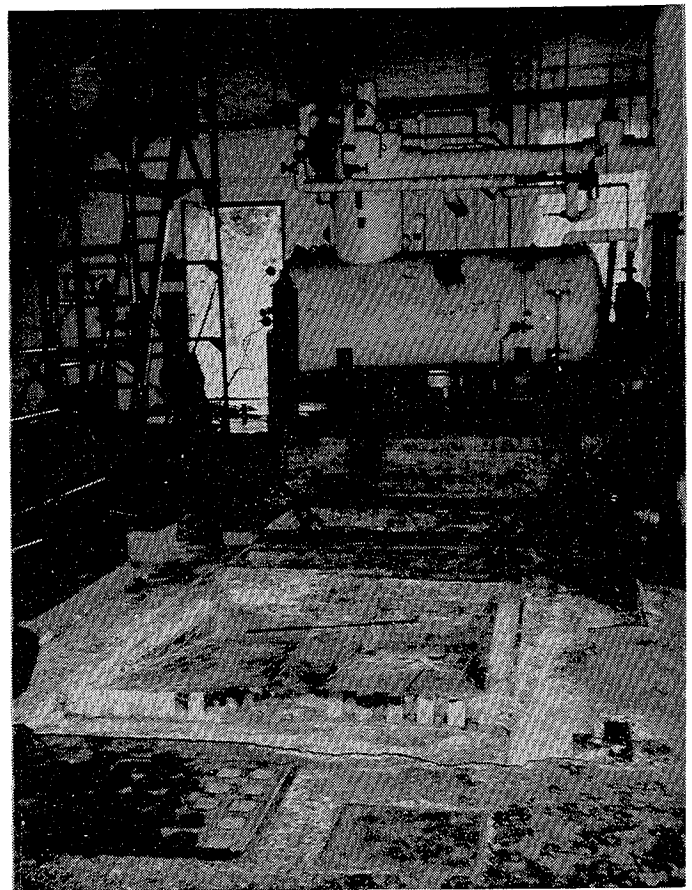

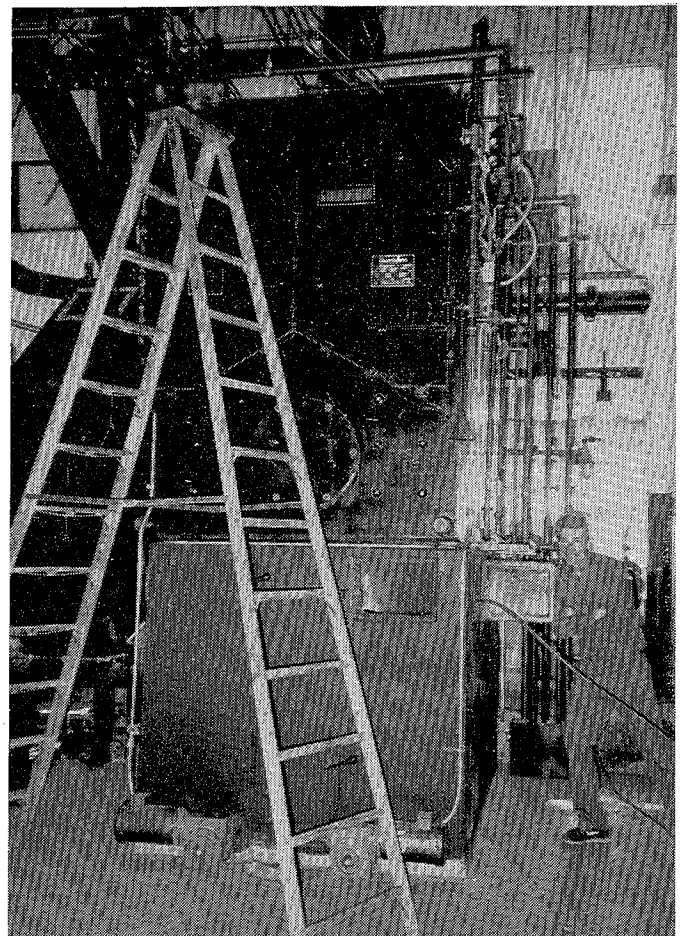
Empty space awaits the installation of a new boiler. See below.

The second Family Learning Vacation was held in June 1989 with 16 families attending. Frank Ziezuila, Gallaudet University, was the main speaker.

Alan Mealka, NDSB Superintendent, assumed a new role as of July 1, 1989, as superintendent of both NDSB and the North Dakota School for the Blind in Grand Forks.

The administration building sported a new look the summer of 1989 with the replacement of 117 windows. The old coal-fired boiler was dismantled and removed the same summer and was replaced with a new, more efficient coal boiler later that fall.

CARE, Communication Aids for Real-Life Experiences, was initiated the fall of 1989 for adults aged 20-100 who became hearing impaired later in life. The program is sponsored by NDSB and the Lake Region Senior Citizens Center.



Girl Scout Troop 71 came into existence the fall of 1989 with six members from NDS. The girls previously had been part of a Devils Lake Troop. The new Troop was under the leadership of Sheri Knutson, dormitory counselor.

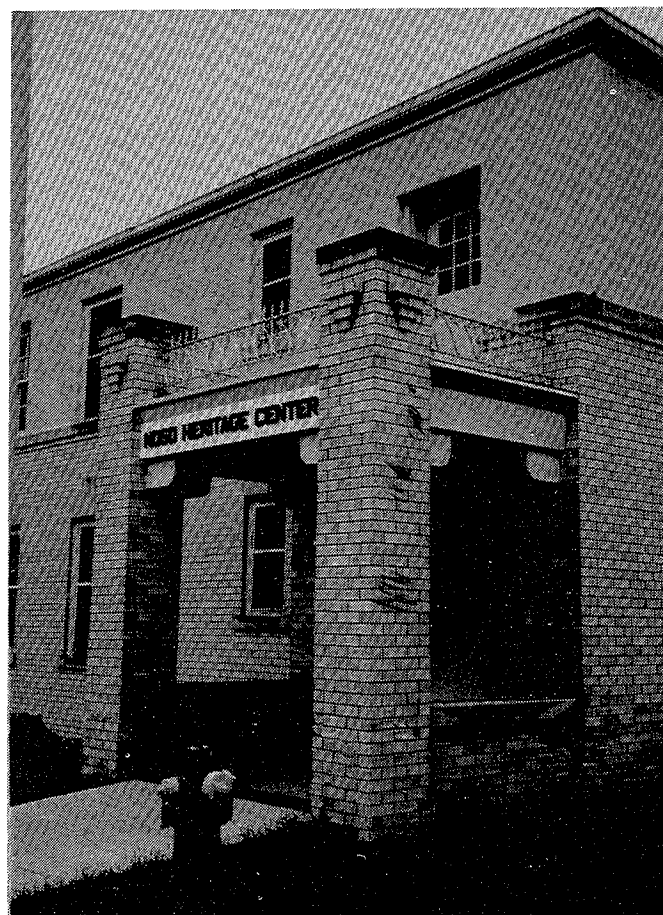

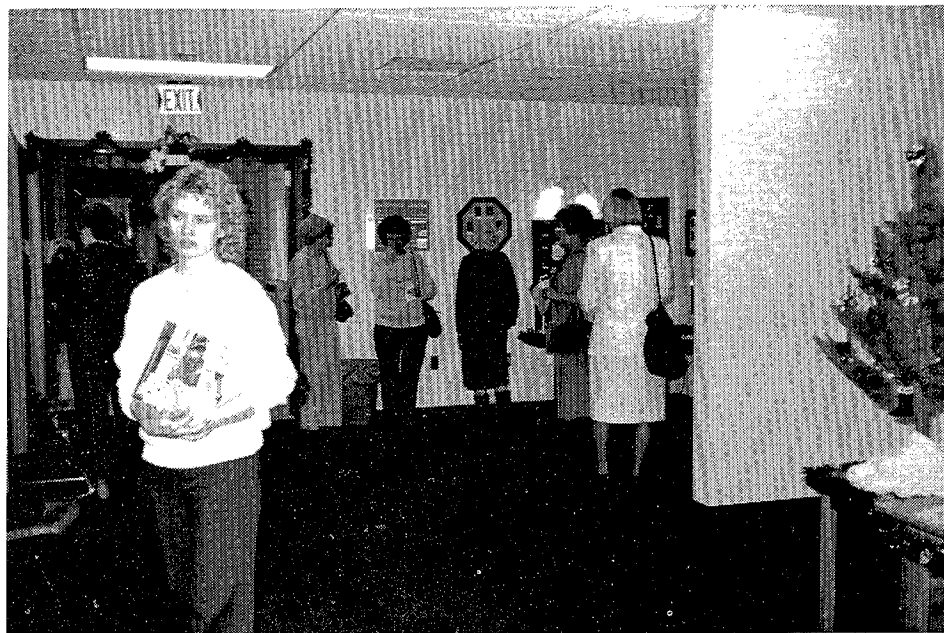
This Centennial Quilt is a part of NDS's Centennial Year. Esther Frelich, NDS '42, did a lot of the preparation and sewed many squares.



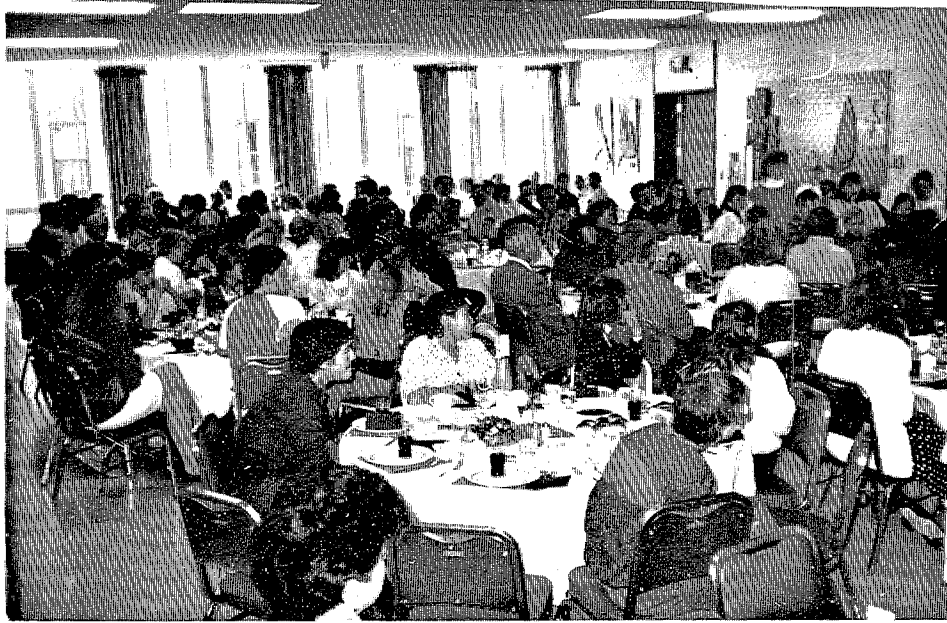
NDS's Heritage Center makes its home in the old hospital building.

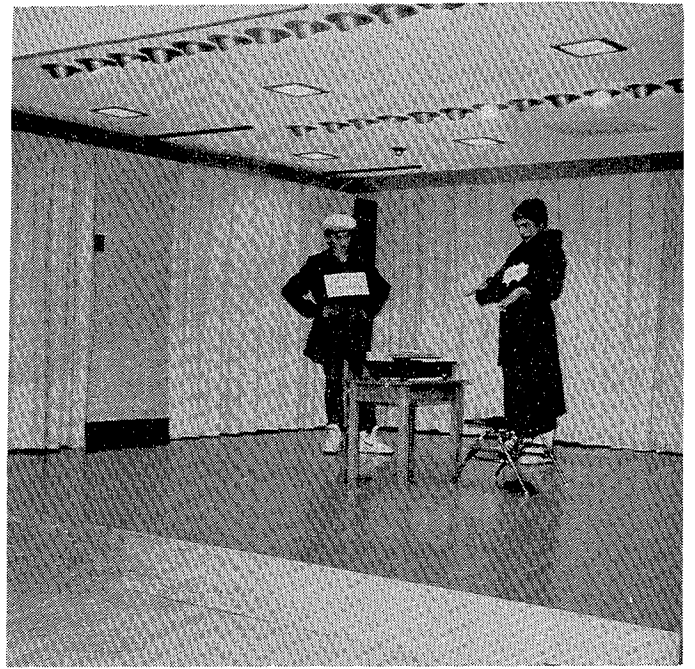
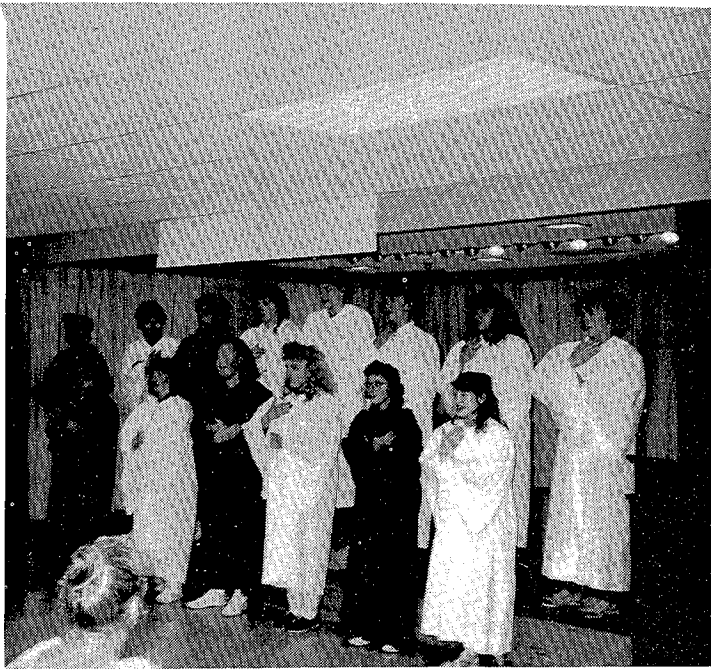


Elementary students open the Christmas Dinner by singing Christmas songs.
