

The 2022-2023 school year began with Paul Olson, the Superintendent at the North Dakota Vision Services (NDVS) as the Interim Superintendent. He and the staff here set the stage for me to arrive in early September. Everyone helped me learn about the staff and students. One day, I saw a student with their adult in Walmart and introduced myself only to find out she, in fact, works here and I tell her 'good morning' every day. In my defense, she looked totally different with her hair down and out of context. We had a great laugh!



This year, the legislature was in session, so I quickly learned about the political systems and processes in North Dakota. I learned more about how our budget works and about the funding for special projects we had requested. I felt fortunate to have had experience presenting to legislative committees in another state and North Dakota's process was similar. Our budget was passed with almost everything for which we asked and we are grateful for the legislative support and the support from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI).

Due to staffing shortages and additional younger students enrolling, I spent a lot of time in the dorm. So much learning and growing happens there. I am humbled when parents allow us to tuck their children into bed every night and keep them safe and healthy. Our Residential Program is the backbone to our on-campus Education Program!

Our student population grew from 18 when I started in September. Our highest number of students on campus was 23 and we ended the year with 22 students total. We had lots of visitors – some potential students and their families and/or school teams and some interested groups like ASL students.

We continued to serve students and families through our PIP/K-12 Outreach Program and adults through our Adult Outreach program. These services are critical to our vision, our mission, and the foundation of our purpose. Through our PIP/K-12 Outreach Program, students and families as well as school teams learn about our campus Education and Residential Programs. Through our Adult Outreach Program, individuals who have lost their hearing learn how to be safe and continue to be independent so they can remain in their homes as they grow older.

Over this year, we had lots and lots of happy times, a few sad times, and so many learning times. We said goodbye to some staff members and hello to new or returning staff members. This Banner hopes to capture all those hellos, goodbyes, and many of the moments in-between.

### NDSD/RC Welcomes Donna Sorensen as new Superintendent



Donna E Sorensen came to North Dakota in September 2022 to serve as the Superintendent here at the North Dakota School for the Deaf/Resource Center. She holds a Bachelor degree in Deaf Education from the University of Montevallo in Alabama, a Master degree in Parent-Infant Education from Gallaudet University in Washington DC, a Principal Certificate from Washington State University, and a Superintendent Certificate from the University of Montana. She was a National Board Certified Teacher (NBCT), Exceptional Needs Specialist: Deaf and Hard of Hearing for 20 years certifying in 2002 and recertifying in 2012. She is a Returned Peace Corps Volunteer (RPCV) teaching deaf students in Kenya from 2003-2005. She completed many courses in Teaching Students with Visual Impairments at Texas Tech University.

Donna taught students who were Deaf and Hard of Hearing for twelve years in the PreK-12 setting: nine years in a mainstream program, two years overseas, and two years at a residential school. She served as a Distance Learning Coordinator, an Elementary Principal, and an Outreach Director in residential schools for one year each. She has served as a Superintendent for 7 years at two different residential schools. For one year, she also worked in one state's Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) program and organized the annual statewide EDHI virtual conference. She also worked closely with that state's Early Intervention Program.

Donna loves to learn and she loves to travel. She has presented at conferences and workshops in the United States, Kenya, Jamaica, and Russia. Topics have included American Sign Language, Kenyan Sign Language, Deaf Culture, HIV/AIDS, visual language, poverty, and literacy and reading with students who are deaf and hard of hearing.

Donna is interested in equity, equality, access to information, and access to the environment. Her interests include cultural studies and experiences when people from two or more cultures must interact. Her published article "The American Way" in the April 2006 edition of *VIEWS*, a publication from the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, focused on cultural perspectives and interacting within other cultures.

Some of her unique experiences include volunteering at a therapeutic horseback riding center and learning about hippotherapy, competing in a camel race across a desert, scuba diving in the Indian Ocean, whitewater rafting the Nile River, interpreting and providing support services for Deafblind individuals, attending Deaflympic events in Rome (Italy), and 10+ years of volunteering at Deaf Teen Leadership (DTL) camp in Washington State.

In her free time, she loves volleyball, scrapbooking, yoga, camping, and hanging out with her 2 adorable puppies, age 9 and 10. Her favorite place in Devils Lake is the White Horse Hill Game Reserve where she can smell the forest and listen to the birds sing.

She is thrilled to have completed her first year here in ND and looks forward to continued learning and growing with everyone here.

## Lilia Bakken Retires after 43 Years at NDSD

Lilia (Horner) Bakken graduated from Mary College (University of Mary) in 1973 with a degree in Social and Behavioral Sciences. Upon graduation, Lilia began her search for a job and shortly thereafter, was hired at the North Dakota School for the Deaf. Lilia assumed that her job there would be temporary and never imagined that, more than 40 years later, she would be retiring from what had become a permanent career at NDSD.





In the fall of 1973, when Lilia was newly hired, she worked as NDSD's

school secretary. Not knowing sign language and captivated by the

hands that moved around her, it became her mission to learn sign language. With guidance from several patient deaf teachers, she gradually learned to communicate with them. A year later, Lilia was asked to be the assistant in the Reading Lab. Two years after that, she became Coordinator of the federally-funded Dormitory Language Project.





In 1976, Lilia married Rodney Bakken. The Bakkens had two children (Kelly and Annie) and while the kids were still very young, Lilia left her job at NDSD to be a full-time mom. When their kids became schoolage, Superintendent Holman called to recruit Lilia back to NDSD to teach sign language and to interpret and tutor students who attended the Vocational-Tech Center. Lilia was happy to return to NDSD and she continued to work there until her retirement in December, 2022.










Through the years, Lilia's career at NDSD provided her with an array of job experiences.

Lilia's knowledge of and love for NDSD is known to all and she is sorely missed. We wish her



Cindy Mays and Turi Leiphon are prime examples.



Growing an Amaryllis plant has become a winter tradition in the NDSD Library. The only thing more interesting than planting the flower and watching it grow, is dissecting it.














NDSD students celebrated Read Captions Across America Day and Dr. Seuss' birthday in Seussville (the NDSD library).

Students participated in a number of games of skill, a tattoo parlor, art activities, a Cat Cake Walk, and Seuss Snacks.





## Parent-Infant and School-Age

The North Dakota School for the Deaf/Resource Center Parent-Infant and School-Age Outreach Department continues to provide services to families and schools with children impacted by hearing loss. Consultations to schools around the state were offered along with the completion of several assessments. The Outreach Department is involved in the Outcomes & Developmental Data Assistance Center for Early Hearing Detection & Intervention (EHDI) Programs (ODDACE), which is a national data base that assesses children with hearing loss 0-5 years. This year, they implemented the utilization of the LENA program which delivers reliable feedback on how much caregivers are using spoken language with infants, toddlers, and preschool students. It samples the types of conversations families are having with their child with a hearing loss and offers suggestions to increase conversational turns.

The Outreach Department also sponsored their regular yearly events such as the Regional Pumpkin Patch Family Days, Virtual Santa, and Family Engagement events.

After a four-year hiatus, North Dakota School for the Deaf is proud to co-sponsor, with South Dakota Services for the Deaf and Gallaudet University Midwest region, the Midwest Conference on Deaf Education in Sioux Falls, SD, held in June.

The Outreach Department continues to expand services offering two on-line support groups. One is for families who have children with Microtia and/or Atresia. It started on November 9th celebrating National Microtia/Atresia Awareness Day. The other group is "Growing Up Deaf," featuring deaf adults sharing what it was like for them as a person with a hearing loss. Both of these support groups are held every other month.

The department also hosted a table at several conferences and events throughout the year. A variety of sign classes are offered to meet needs around the state. Two NDSD staff members were trained as Deaf Mentors and mentoring has begun with a couple of families. Our hope is to expand this in the future.

He was born in Oak Hill, West Viriginia, on December 12<sup>th</sup> 1956 to Josephine (Agee) and Joe Lawson, the eldest of seven children, all boys. Drexel spent his formative childhood years in West Virginia before his father relocated the Lawson family to Minot AFB in 1967, resulting in Drexel becoming enrolled at NDSD in the fall of that same year.

It did not take Drexel long to get himself enrolled into NDSD athletics and prove his prowess on the basketball court as one of the top scorers and on the field as a top-notch sprinter and hurdler. Drexel started out joining the Baby Bulldogs basketball team during the 1968-69 school year, and quickly became a top scorer and helped land many wins during the few years that he played for the middle school Bulldogs team. When Drexel got to be old enough to play on the high school team, he proved himself to be a tremendous asset alongside basketball superstar Steven Blehm (NDSD '73). He finished out his high school basketball career with 1,000 career points.

Drexel joined the NDSD track & field team in 1970, showing his track coach Dwight Rafferty that he had strong potential on the field. The 1972 season was when Drexel really began to blossom, consistently placing in the various low hurdle and yard dash events. Aided by Steve Blehm for a while, their consistent placements plus setting record after record at the meets cinched a place for them at state between 1972 to 1976. While Drexel did well for his first time at state in 1972, he did not place. But once again, Coach Rafferty knew Drexel had the potential to succeed at meets in the future. When his team went on to attend the Deaf American Mythical Track & Field meet in 1972, Drexel's 5th place in the 220-yard dash and 5th place in the long jump helped the NDSD team place 11th overall. When Drexel's team competed in the State Class B High School Track meet in the spring of 1975, he became the second sprinter ever in the history of North Dakotan high school track to cinch 1st-place wins in four events (the 100-, 220- and 440-yard dashes as well as the 180-yard low hurdles). The "Deaf American" publication listed Drexel as a top athlete in five events nation-wide for 1975.

By Drexel's senior year 1975-1976, he had already established himself as a superstar athlete. He got the opportunity to compete in the very first Pan-American Games of the Deaf in Venezuela in November of 1975, on a boys' track team that comprised of 10 of the best deaf athletes with Coach Rafferty as head coach of that team. What a wonderful honor for them both! Drexel was involved in a motorcycle crash, but in no way did that prevent him from continuing his track career at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls and ultimately participating in the 13<sup>th</sup> World Games for the Deaf in Bucharest, Romania, in 1977, in which he snagged a gold medal in the 400 hurdles.

Drexel found much happiness and success in all areas of his life, after college he moved to California. He met and fell in love with Renee Trosin, and they were united in marriage on February 14, 1992. From that marriage became four children: Laura, Elijah, Faith and Joshua. Drexel also held employment at Chardonnay Golf Club, Eagle Vines Golf Club and then Nick's Custom Golf Cars before finally retiring in 2022. One of Drexel's proudest moments in his life was when he and wife Renee became first-time grandparents to Isla.





## From the North Dakota State Library NDSD Collection

A few years ago, the <u>State Library</u> (NDSL) formed a digital collection partnership with its sister agency, the <u>School for the Deaf</u> (NDSD). The <u>Digital Initiatives</u> <u>Department</u> at NDSL focused on digitizing the school's newsletters and making them publicly available on Digital Horizons. The *Banner*, the official newsletter of NDSD, was first published in 1891, and it is still published today. This digital collection was called the 'North Dakota School for the Deaf Banner.'

NDSL and NDSD decided to expand their collection partnership. The school has such a rich history, dating back to the 1890s, that it seemed appropriate to include more than just newsletters.

Several updates have been made. First and foremost, the name of the collection was changed. 'Banner' was dropped from the title to reflect a broader name: the 'North Dakota School for the Deaf collection.

The *Banner* newsletters are still a core part of the collection. All issues of the *Banner* have been uploaded and are text searchable. Other documents, such as the school's trustee minutes and biennial reports, have also been added. Currently, the collection has biennial reports from 1890 to 2019. The collection also has registration ledgers from 1890 to 1933 that include information on the first 600 students who attended the school.

**Images** make up a large portion of the collection. These images include buildings, classrooms, sports, graduating classes, superintendents, and many more themes relating to the school.

The collection includes newsletters, biennial reports, photographs, videos, objects,



and documents relating to NDSD since its inception in the 1890s to the present. Consult the collection's finding aid to learn more about it and the school, or start exploring the collection by going directly to Digital Horizons.


