Back to School Tips

for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Students

The following are things to get ready to help your child have a very successful year

- ♦ Review your child's Individual Education Plan (IEP) to ensure the goals are still appropriate and what should be in place to carry out the plan.
- ♦ Be sure all needed equipment are in place.
- Check that amplification systems (hearing aids, cochlear implants, sound field or FM systems, etc.) are working properly
 - Extra batteries
 - Listening Kit stethoscope, listening hoop, etc.
- ♦ In-services for new staff working with your child
 - classroom tips
 - tips to enhance auditory listening and speech reading
 - classroom modifications
- Use of caption media be sure materials have captioning and that staff knows how to turn on caption mode
- Check rooms for acoustics
- ♦ Be sure related support staff are in place
- ♦ Establish a means of communication between school and home
- ♦ Be sure staff is comfortable working with equipment and knows what to do if equipment fails to work. Have a back up plan if it does not work
- Establish routines in the rules your child should follow
- ♦ Have the most current audiological evaluation done
