HEARING LOSS AND CELL PHONES



Communicating with a cell phone can be challenging for individuals who have a hearing loss. Today's technology has made it possible to stay connected with others.

- 1. If hearing others while talking on your cell phone is a problem, consider a HEAR ALL. It pairs to smart phones using Bluetooth and up to 40dB amplification, with volume and tone controls.
- 2. Do you miss calls because you cannot hear the cell phone ring? Never miss a call again with the Serene Innovations RF-200 Cell Phone Signaler/Flasher. This signaling device for landline and mobile phones, notifies you of incoming calls by phone, Skype, FaceTime and text messages.
- 3. Purchasing hearing aids that are Smartphone compatible allows you to connect hearing aids directly to your smartphone. You can stream calls and audio from your smartphone to your hearing aids.
- 4. If your hearing loss is severe, increased amplification may not help. There's an App for that! InnoCaption provides free, real-time captioning of phone calls through a mobile app, available on both iOS and Android devices

You may be eligible for the Telecommunications Equipment Distribution Services (TEDS) program. This program is designed to provide specialized telecommunications equipment for North Dakota residents. 


In 1908, a young deaf man by the name of Thomas Sheridan came to the North Dakota School for the Deaf to teach in the high school department. From 1908 to 1947 (for 39 years), Mr. Sheridan taught math courses. Sheridan was well-loved by his students and highly respected by his colleagues. He was known, nationwide, as a pedagogue in the profession of deaf education and was recognized by his colleagues as a great schoolmaster.

Interesting note: Sheridan was an adept magician and often mystified his students with his magic tricks.







Each day, for 39 years, Thomas
Sheridan walked from his home to school. Even in the stormiest weather, he rarely missed a day in his classroom. In 1994, the ND Association of the Deaf, in his honor and memory, named the road that leads onto the school campus the **Thomas Sheridan Road.**

Banner Flashback, 1948: upon Thomas Sheridan's death the Superintendent wrote condolences; "Thomas was a gentleman and a scholar. Our school is the better for his having lived and loved and labored in it, and his memory will be an inspiration to all who knew him."
